REFLECTION FROM THE PARISH PRIEST FOR THE

2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

Our readings today continue on from the Christmas season where we celebrated God coming to us in Jesus. Now, as we enter Ordinary Time, we begin to look more closely into our own hearts and lives to see how open we are to receive Christ into our lives.

God is creating something new in the Church. God creates a new people out of the chaos he finds us in - like what he did with the primordial chaos in creation. God creates a new land out of devastation; God creates a new Spirit-filled community out of a fractured society. At Christmas the inbreaking of God came in a new way. Even Jesus experiences a call to newness: through Mary, God calls Jesus out into public ministry - the first of his miracles here at Cana. In this Ordinary Time we are asked to see how this newness can transform not just ourselves, but our world.

However, God does not leave us alone on this journey. The same Spirit that descended on Jesus at his baptism, is the same Spirit that is given to the Church in all its variety - for preaching wisdom or instruction, for faith, for healing, for miracles, for prophecy, for recognizing



spirits, for tongues, for interpreting tongues. No single person is expected to have all of these, in fact the Spirit spreads these gifts throughout the community (which is one reason why trying to live the Christian life on your own, you miss out on so many other gifts to help you).

There are times when this Spirit comes in special ways - In Advent it overshadowed Mary and it came again at Jesus' baptism, it came to the Church gathered at Pentecost and to each of us at Confirmation. But the Spirit is also active wherever God is present to create something new. So we should continue to seek and notice the presence of the Spirit all around us, every day of our lives.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 12:4-11

Brothers and sisters: There are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of services, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who activates all of them in everyone.

To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another discernment of spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues.

All these are activated by one and the same Spirit, who allots to each one individually just as the Spirit chooses.

GOSPEL: John 2:1-11

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana in Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servants, "Do whatever he tells you."

Now standing there were six stone water jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding about a hundred litres. Jesus said to the servants, "Fill the jars with water." And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, "Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward." So they took it.

When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now."

Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him. After this he went down to Capernaum with his mother, his brothers, and his disciples; and they remained there a few days.

THE CANA STORY

The story of the wedding feast in Cana in Galilee is unique to John but is only ever head today in the Year of Luke. It doesn't appear among the readings from John that dominate the last weeks of Lent and the whole of Easter.

Luke, as we saw during Advent with his account of the visitation, is a master of the art of telling a human story with divine purpose. John takes this even further. The stories he tells—the wedding feast, the woman at the well, the man born blind, the raising Lazarus—are about signs that are meant to provoke insight into Jesus identity. The narratives have disconcerting twists and seemingly disrespectful response to his mother at the wedding in Cana.

<u>John is alerting us</u> to the true import of Jesus' rescue of the embarrassed newlyweds. This sign is far more than an act of charity. It is a <u>revelation of who Jesus is</u>. The Cana story is a commentary on what John wrote in <u>the prologue</u> to his gospel: "through the Law was given through Moses, <u>grace and truth have come through Jesus Christ."</u> It prepares us for <u>the epilogue</u>, the full revelation of divine glory when <u>Jesus is raised up</u> to be again "nearest the Father's heart."


THERE'S NOTHING ORDINARY ABOUT "ORDINARY TIME"!

The seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter all have names that identify them and evoke their distinctive character. It has to be confessed that "Ordinary Time" fails to do the same. Even the more accurate "Ordered Time" has no great appeal, but at least it offers a clue. In the course of the thirty-four weeks of the season, we read in an ordered way through the gospel account of Jesus' public ministry.

Guided this year by <u>Luke, we accompany Jesus</u> from his baptism through to his final discourse on the end of time. We witness his preaching, teaching, healing, praying and wayfaring. We see how he cares for the poor and lowly and how inclusive he is of women. We warm to <u>his message of mercy</u> but are taken aback of <u>his demand for radical detachment from possessions and family</u>. We are impressed by the centrality of <u>prayer</u> in his life, by his familiarity with <u>the Spirit</u> and by his determination to face the fate of prophets in Jerusalem.

Of our other companions in Ordinary Time, the prophets, wisdom writers and historians of the Old Testament come and go, but Paul the apostle, like Luke, is constantly by our side. We are amazed at the indefatigable energy with which he expounds the mystery of Christ, addresses divisive problems in his scattered communities and endures all kinds of hardship. In the end there's nothing ordinary about "Ordinary Time"!.



We wish to make the memorial as financially accessible as possible. The cost to the family would simply be the cost of the plaque. At the present time, a plaque costs about \$70 with the writing on it. We are free to acquire plaques from anywhere, provided they are the regular size of 30cm x 20cm.
