Reflection from Fr Renato for the

Fourth Sunday of Lent

"Compassion and Mercy"

"Because this son or daughter was dead and has come back to life; he/she was lost and is found."

It is tax collectors and sinners who were seeking the company of Jesus where as the Pharisees and Scribes complain because he "welcomes and eats with sinners." Jesus then tells a powerful story that reveals the heart of God to those "who are lost and for Jesus who were dead."

In the story there is the Father and his two sons/daughters- one younger and the other older. The younger wanted his own way and asks for his inheritance. The older son continues looking after the farm animals and property. The younger son/ younger daughter goes "to a distant country and squanders all his/her money on life of debauchery." Down and out it was not easy to survive because where he/she was the place experienced a "severe famine." The young man/daughter comes to his/her senses "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son/your daughter; treat me as one of your paid servants." He/she names his/her sin and wants to change.

The Father with compassion and mercy who always waits goes out and welcomes his son/daughter, hugging and kissing "he ran to the boy boy/the daughter, clasped him/her in his arms and kissed him/her." The son/daughter tries to make his/her speech of repentance, but it is totally ignored. Instead the Father orders for the best clothes to be brought out and a magnificent banquet to be laid on: "...For this son/daughter was dead and is alive again; he/she was lost and is found.!" The Father does not berate them or admonish them or bad mouth them. He accepts and welcome them because he was waiting. The same for us.

The elder brother/sister coming back from his/her days works hears the sounds of merry making and when told becomes very angry because nothing was done for him/her. He/she was loyal and faithful to his Father and did not squander his Father's wealth. The Father pleads with the elder brother/sister saying. "you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But...this brother/sister of yours was dead and has come to life; he/she was lost and has been found. We have to celebrate says the Father. The story is a clear reply to the criticism of the scribes and Pharisees. They simply did not understand the mind of God as revealed in Jesus behaviour. Our question is how well do we understand?

I can be absolutely sure of God's mercy and forgiveness, provided I turn back to him in true sorrow. I need to have the same attitude of compassion with people who offend me. I must be ready to forgive and to be

There are three people in this story- which of the three most represents me? Which one would I want to be like? Good to ask why the elder son/daughter did not have the heart and mind of the Father. Are they the real sinners who shut their hearts against God's compassionate love, The parable does not tell us what the elder son/daughter ultimately decides? What would you do?

First Reading: Joshua 5: 9-12

The Lord said to Joshua, "Today I have rolled away from you the disgrace of Egypt." While the children of Israel were camped in Gilgal they kept the Passover in the evening on the fourteenth day of the month in the plains of Jericho. On the day after the Passover, on the very day, they ate the produce of the land, unleavened cakes and parched grain. The manna ceased on the day they ate the produce of the land, and the children of Israel no longer had manna; they ate the crops of the land of Canaan that year.

Responsorial Psalm 33 (34): 2-7 R: Taste and see the goodness of the Lord.

I will bless the Lord at all times; his praise shall continually be in my mouth. My soul makes its boast in the Lord; let the humble hear and be glad. R.

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 5: 17-21

Brothers and sisters: If anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, Christ, God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake God made Christ to be sin who knew no sin, so that in Christ we might become the righteousness of God.

Gospel: Luke 15: 1-3, 11-32
All the tax collectors and sinners were coming near to listen to Jesus. And the Pharisees and the scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow welcomes sinners and eats with them." So he told them a parable: "There was a man who had two sons. The young of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So the father divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and travelled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. The young man would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe - the best one - and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!' And they began to celebrate. Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. The slave replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' Then the elder son became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him! Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found."

As we receive the pledge of things yet hidden in heaven and are nourished while still on earth with the Bread that comes from on high, we humbly entreat you, O Lord, that what is being brought about in us in mystery may come to true completion. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

LENTEN PRAYER HELPS

Helps for prayer- Consolation and Desolation

During Lent, we reflect upon our spiritual state and on our interior movement. Are we moving toward more doubt, fear, and anger? Or are we moving toward greater faith, hope, and love? The Ignatian principles of consolation and desolation can help us.

A person dwells in a state of consolation when she or he is moving toward God's active presence in the world. Consolation can hold many emotions and experiences.

A person dwells in a state of desolation when she or he is moving away from God's active presence in the world. Desolation also holds many emotions and experiences

Helpful list to help when a person is trying to determine if they are in consolation or desolation.

Desolation:

- Turns us in on ourselves
- Drives us down the spiral ever deeper into our own negative feelings
- Cuts us off from community
- Makes us want to give up on the things that used to be important to us
- Takes over our whole consciousness and crowds out our distant vision
- Covers up all our landmarks [the signs of our journey with God so far]
- Drains us of energy

Consolation

- Directs our focus outside and beyond ourselves
- Lifts our hearts so that we can see the joys and sorrows of other people
- Bonds us more closely to our human community
- Generates new inspiration and ideas
- Restores balance and refreshes our inner vision
- Shows us where God is active in our lives and where God is leading us
- Releases new energy in us

As we learn to recognize when we are in desolation and consolation, we can respond accordingly: changing course (through prayer, community, discernment, spiritual direction) when in desolation, and staying the course when in consolation.

2. Daily prayer: "Lord, grant that I may see you more clearly, love you more dearly, and follow you more nearly, day by day. Amen
