
REFLECTION FROM THE PARISH PRIEST

21st Sunday in Ordinary Time

The saying goes: "Power corrupts, and absolute power corrupts absolutely"; that is, unless it is from God, because God's power is different. God's power is about being of service, about being a shepherd, about being the power of weakness (through the cross).

The Hebrew Scriptures remind us of the way that God works with the people. Moses is more like a shepherd leading the people out of slavery than a ruler over them. God wanted to be a Father to the Israelites, but they wanted a king like other people around them. So eventually he raises up two great kings: David is a very powerful king, yet flawed individual. Solomon knows his own limitations as a ruler and so asks for wisdom and a discerning heart rather than strength and might.

Peter, who is equally flawed, is at least open to the grace of God's revelation about Jesus. He eventually come to refer to himself as "servant and apostle" (2 Peter 1:1). But it was a long journey for Peter. He had to fight with his own inclinations to power and prestige; he had to fight his own weakness and temptations to disown Jesus, and his own lack of faith. But one of Peter's great gifts is that he always returns to Jesus, he seeks forgiveness and deepens his relationship in the process.



The question is then being put to us: "Who do you say the Son of Man is?" Can you recognize Jesus walking in the streets and living in your home and at your work? This is a question of faith not knowledge, so it is OK to admit, "I do believe, help my unbelief" (Mk 9:24). So let us learn from Peter that, firstly when we fall and lose focus on Jesus, that we always return to him. And secondly, that we use our power, our leadership, as a "servant and apostle" of Christ's mission, and not for our own glory.



Praying with the Saints

We will have a shared lunch. Please bring a dish and drinks to share

This week, we celebrate the feast days of some of the greatest Saints in our Church. Why not make an activity out of learning about and praying with the Saints this week with your family and friends.

ST MONICA — Feast Day: 27th August

Monica was born in Tagaste, Nth Africa, in the year 331. She died in Ostia, Italy, in 387. Before her marriage, her faith bore fruit in her recovery from a drinking problem and later helped bring her husband and mother-in-law to Christianity. She undertook many years of penance and prayer for her brilliant but wayward son Saint Augustine. Following his conversion and baptism in Milan, she died at the beginning of her journey home to Africa. St Monica is remembered for her parental devotion, her patience, and her persistence in prayer. She is the patron saint of alcoholics, conversion, married women and mothers.

ST AUGUSTINE—Feast Day: 28th August

Augustine was born at Tagaste, Nth Africa, in 354. He died at Hippo in 430. Though enrolled by his mother Monica as a catechumen, he renounced the Christian faith and espoused Manicheism. He taught in Carthage, Rome, and Milan. He lived for fifteen years with a woman, who remains unknown and with whom he had a son, named Adeodatus. He was baptised in 387, together with his son, after a long inner struggle and under the influence of Saint Ambrose, and the prayers of his mother, Saint Monica. He became Bishop of Hippo for thirty-four years, and lived a communal life with his clergy and served the many needs of his people at a time of political and cultural collapse. He is remembered as a model pastor and as a preacher and writer, whose though has had an enduring influence in Christian history. Saint Augustine is the patron saint of printers and theologians.

THE PASSION OF ST JOHN THE BAPTIST—Feast Day: 29th August It is John the Baptist who has pointed the way to Christ. John's life and death were a giver over of self for God and other people. His simple style of life was one of complete detachment from earthly possessions. His heart was centered on God and the call that he heard from the Spirit of God speaking to his heart. Confident of God's grace, he had the courage to speak words of condemnation, repentance, and salvation.

Each of us has a calling to which we must listen. No one will ever repeat the mission of John, and yet all of us are called to that very mission. It is the role of the Christian to witness to Jesus.

Whatever our position in this world, we are called to be disciples of Christ. By our words and deeds, others should realise that we live in the joy of knowing that Jesus is Lord. We do not have to depend upon our own limited resources, but can draw strength from the vastness of Christ's saving grace.

A New Engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples



About Social Justice Sunday and the Bishops Social Justice Statement

With a tradition stretching back to 1940, the Australian Bishops Conference contributes to the development of local Catholic Social Teaching by releasing a major social justice statement each year in the lead up to Social Justice Sunday, which this year falls on Sunday 27 August. These statements encourage the Catholic community to reflect and act on the social, economic and ecological aspects of the Church's mission.

The title of the Social Justice Statement 2023-24 is Listen, Learn, Love: A new engagement with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples. It includes experiences and views shared by the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholic Council (NATSICC) and calls for the Church – and society more widely – to listen to, engage and address the pain of First Nations Peoples in new ways, in order to bring an end to centuries of injustice.

The Bishop's Social Justice Statement discusses the upcoming referendum regarding Indigenous Constitutional recognition through a Voice to Parliament as an important moment for Australia as we listen to our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander brothers and sisters on this important decision. The Statement encourages Catholics and wider Australia to seek out and carefully consider information about the proposal, with special reference to the hopes and aspirations of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples. The contribution of NATSICC to the Statement includes these comments:

Australians have an opportunity to begin a new chapter this year with the referendum on the Voice to Parliament... We, NATSICC, feel that the referendum is too important to fail. The consequences for our people and the whole nation would be devastating. NATSICC in 'Listen, Learn, Love'

As encouraged by the Statement, CSSV has been actively engaged in facilitating dialogues, sharing information and listening to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people about the proposed Voice to Parliament. In February 2023, CSSV released Relentlessly Pursuing Reconciliation in which CSSV's support for the Voice, along with treaty and truth-telling, were outlined. This concluded with the words:

We have reached a time of great possibility in making meaningful reparation for the past and building a better future — in this moment it is the offer of a constitutional referendum to decide upon a Voice to the Australian Parliament. We know that the success of any referendum relies on a 'double majority' vote in the affirmative. We implore each member of the Victorian and Australian community to make every effort to ensure this valuable opportunity is not missed. By finding common ground, setting aside political differences and seizing this as an opportunity to listen and learn we can positively bring into being a time where all in Australia "may have life and have it abundantly".

This Social Justice Sunday we encourage you to reflect on the place of First Nations Peoples, new ways we can engage and walk together, and the importance of the upcoming referendum and the outcomes that will lead to better consultation, improved policies and services, and stronger communities.
