REFLECTION FROM THE PARISH PRIEST FOR THE 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus does like the Pharisees and Scribes – he eats with them, he even told one of the scribes that he was not far from the Kingdom of Heaven after he answered a question rightly. What Jesus cannot stand though is hypocrisy: "saying one thing and doing another". What they ought to be focused on is helping people to live righteous lives – it helps to follow the law, to teach and to pray – but they fail by not also showing that they practice what they preach.

Jesus needs people of integrity to be disciples. If a person has integrity, then his or her words and actions match. This person will not say one thing and do another. This person will back up words with actions.

In the Kingdom things are often turned upside down – "the greatest among you must be your servant". In our society we can often judge a person's importance by how much power and authority they have. God looks at things differently. Jesus asks us to focus on our fellow human beings and his creation. We need to "turn the other cheek" and forgive when we feel like hitting back. We need to open our eyes to the needs of people around us, in our own neighbourhoods, who are homeless, or unemployed or are hungry. It is easy to ignore them, but a humble person is someone who truly practices Jesus' call to "love your neighbour as you love yourself."

Jesus' words of warning may have been directed at the scribes and Pharisees of his time, but they are a warning for us too. Do not get caught in this trap of exalting ourselves too highly, do not forget the commandments and teachings that the law presents to us.

Addressing the people and his disciples Jesus said, 'The scribes and the Pharisees occupy the chair of Moses. They tie up heavy burdens and lay them on men's shoulders, but will they lift a finger to move them? Not they! Everything they do is done to attract attention, like wearing broader phylacteries and longer tassels, like wanting to take the place of honour at banquets and the front seats in the synagogues, being greeted obsequiously in the market squares and having people call them Rabbi.

"Pope Francis closes synod with 'dream' of a church with open doors"

To reform the church is to put God first and adore him, and to love and serve others, Pope Francis said at Mass marking the conclusion of <u>the first session</u> of the Synod of Bishops on synodality.

"This is the church we are called to 'dream': <u>a church that is the servant of all</u>, the servant of the least of our brothers and sisters; a church that never demands an attestation of 'good behaviour,' but <u>welcomes</u>, <u>serves</u>, <u>loves</u>, <u>forgives</u>; a church with open doors that is a haven of mercy," he said.

"We may have plenty of good ideas on how to reform the church, but <u>let's remember</u>: to adore God and to love our brothers and sisters with his love, that is the great and perennial reform," the pope said in his homily at Mass in St Peter's Basilica, October 29.

Thousands of faithful stood at the start at Mass as synod members and participants processed into the basilica. The procession was led by non-ordained members followed by bishops and then cardinals. The synod on synodality <u>marked the first time laypeople and women religious</u> could take part as voting members. Of the total 364 members, close to 25% were "non-bishop members" and 54 of them were women.

"Dear friends, the general assembly of the synod has now concluded," the pope said in his homily. "Today we do not see the full fruit of this process, but <u>with farsightedness we look to the horizon</u> opening up before us."

<u>"The Lord</u> will guide us and help us to be a more synodal and missionary church, a church that adores God and serves the women and men of our time, going forth to bring to everyone the consoling joy of the Gospel," he said.

As the church concludes this stage of its journey, he said, "it is important to look at the 'principle and foundation' from which everything begins ever anew: love.

"Loving God with our whole life and loving our neighbours as ourselves," he said, is "the heart of everything."
